

Clean the Safe, Nontoxic Way for Just Pennies



These recipes for natural cleaning formulas are safe and nontoxic. Most of the ingredients are in your kitchen now or can be easily found in a supermarket, natural food store, or pharmacy.

BAKING SODA (sodium bicarbonate): Cleans, deodorizes, removes stains and softens fabrics

BORAX (sodium borate): Natural minteral that kills mold and bacteria. An alternative to bleach, it deodorizes, removes stains and boosts the cleaning power of soap.

CASTILE AND VEGETABLE OIL BASED SOAPS: Cleans everything.

CORNSTARCH: Starch clothes, absorbs oil and grease.

HERBS AND ESSENTIALS OILS: For disinfecting and fragrance

LEMON JUICE: Cuts grease, removes perspiration and other stains from clothing. Bleach alternative.

SALT (sodium chloride): An abrasive.

VINEGAR (acetic acid): Cuts grease, removes stains and is an excellent water softener.

WASHING SODA (sodium carbonate): Cleans clothes, softens water, cuts grease and disinfects. Increases the cleaning power of soap.

Label all of your ingredients and keep them out of the reach of children. While most of these all natural cleaners are not poisonous, some can be harmful or even fatal if swallowed by children or pets. See specific safety precautions on the package

Homemade Cleaners

1. Dishwasher Soap

In a container with a firmly fitting lid mix:

1 c. borax

1 c. baking soda

1/4 c. salt

1/4 c. dry lemonade mix (citric acid)

Place 1 to 2 T. in soap cup and fill rinse cup with white vinegar.

2. Carpet Freshener

4 c. baking soda or cornstarch 35 drops Eucalyptus oil 30 drops Lavender oil 25 drops Rosewood oil or any combination of your favorite essential oils.

Measure 4 cups of baking soda into a bowl, add essential oils. Break up any clumps that form, stir until well mixed. Sprinkle powder liberally from a shaker type can or jar over carpet and let mixture remain for an hour before vacuuming. W ait at least 15 minutes or overnight if odor is strong.

5. Furniture Polish

1/8 c. linseed oil

1/8 c. white vinegar

1/4 c. lemon juice

Mix. Use soft cloth and

Rub into wood.



3. Sink Scrub

1/2 c. baking soda 1-1/2 t. gound cinnamon 2 drops cedar wood essential oil

Combine all ingredients in a bowl. Mix until well blended. Store in an air-tight container such a re-used parmesan cheese shaker. Sprinkle on sink or tub and scrub. Rinse well.

NOTE: This recipe is open to experimentation with essential oils and herbs, such as using dried sage and rosemary essential oil.

4. All Purpose Cleaner

In a 15 oz. spray bottle combine:
2 T. white vinegar
1 t. borax
Hot water to almost fill bottle
Add 2 T. castile soap
5 to 7 drops essential oil.
Shake to mix.
Label bottle listing contents.

Glass Cleaner

Club Soda in spray bottle 2 lint-free cloths: one for wet-wipe and one for the dry-wipe. Club soda doesn't dry as quickly as commercial cleaners but when it does it will be sparkling clean. Sodium citrate is the magic ingredient. Add a few drops of blue food coloring if you like. Label it.

6. Mildew & Germ Killer

1 spray bottle (16 oz.)
2 c. water
1/4 t. (25 drops) tea tree oil
1/4 t. (25 drops) lavender oil
Shake gently before each use.
Spray on surfaces and let
dry--do not wipe dry. Use this
in the kitchen and bathroom
or anywhere you want to kill
germs.

NOTE: Avoid disinfectants containing cresol, phenol, ethanol, kerosene, formaldehyde, ammonia, chlorine bleach, sodium hydroxide and phosphoric acid

7. Floor Cleaner

1/2 gallon vinegar
1/8 c. castile soap
1 tsp. essential oil
Mix together in the vinegar
bottle. Make sure to mark the
bottle as floor cleaner so it
doesn't get mistaken for
vinegar. Shake well before
each use. The ingredients not
dissolving in the vinegar is
normal. Use 1 to 2 cups in a
bucket of warm/hot water to
wash floor.

Toilet Bowl Cleaner

1 c. borax 1/4 c. white vinegar 3 drops lemon or lavender oil Pour all ingredients into toilet bowl. Leave for a while or even overnight. Scrub with toilet brush and flush.
